The Thurrock foodbank have contacted us to say "Here at Thurrock Foodbank we are really struggling with low stock levels caused by a downturn in donations and an increase in people needing our help leading us to buving food regularly to top our stocks. We have launched our AdLent appeal to try and boost our stock levels. It works in a similar way to our reverse advent where we ask individuals, churches, companies and schools to donate items through the period of Lent." Some of us remember Mina Smallman who was the Archdeacon of Southend some years

ago and, 4 years ago, suffered the loss of two of her daughters who were brutally murdered. She was the guest on 'Desert Island Discs' on 21st February and Kim and I thoroughly recommend it both for her incredible story, her faith and her choice of music. Walking through St. Catherine's churchyard at this time of year is a delight as the spring flowers appear. First were the snowdrops followed by crocuses and daffodils of various sizes and a variety of shades of yellow. It is just a shame that on many of the graves are, often garish, artificial flowers that are specifically not allowed in the Diocese's churchyard regulations with the exception of poppies at the season of remembrance, Christmas wreaths and wreaths at the anniversary of the death of the deceased for two weeks. ### Reflections from The Rectory



"To see a World in a Grain of Sand and Heaven in a Wild Flower,

Hold Infinity in the palm of your hand And Eternity in an hour."

These words from the poet William Blake speak of the opportunity to see the greatness of the universe in the smallest elements of creation. Sadly and very often we are simply too busy to take time to do this.

Ahead of us though are the weeks of Lent and the Churches invitation to take time out to ponder and reflect; to give up some of the busyness of life in order that we can prepare ourselves for revisiting the story of Holy Week and Easter. Lent begins on 'Ash Wednesday' (this year it falls on Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> March) and during the weeks that follow, Christians recall the time when Jesus went into the wilderness to fast and pray before beginning his work for God. Whilst there, Jesus was tempted by the devil. But, with the help of key verses from scripture, Jesus was able to resist temptation and stay true to his calling and the risky journey that would take him to Jerusalem.

Many Christians follow a Lenten fast and decide to give something up. Traditionally it would have been foods such as meat and fish, eggs, butter and all things delicious. The Pancakes made on 'Shrove Tuesday' was a good way of using up the sweet ingredients. Many people today continue the Lenten fast and give up something that they especially enjoy such as cakes, crisps and chocolate. The good news is that you are allowed to break your Lenten fast Sundays. This is because every Sunday is a celebration of Easter Sunday and therefore we cannot be mournful or solemn. The breaking of the fast is especially important on Mothering Sunday which marks the half way point in our Lenten journey. Tradition has it that young boys and girls, away in service, would have been allowed to travel home. They would have attended worship at their 'Mother Church' with their family. Flowers would have been gathered on route to give to their mothers and a Simnel cake would have been baked to share together. Do please come and join us at St Catherine's on Sunday 30th March at 10am for our 'Mothering Sunday All-age Communion', and take the opportunity to offer a word of thanks to God for all those who have loved and nurtured you.

Back to Lent - as in previous years we will be holding parish Lent Lunches. They will take place at **St Francis** in Linford, **1pm on Saturday 8th March & Saturday 5th April**. Over a simple lunch of soup and a roll we will take time to share in fellowship together. A small donation can be given if you wish and this will go towards one of the charities we will be supporting. On **Saturday 22nd March at 5pm** we are having a Lent Supper & Beetle Drive also at St Francis. And our final **Lent lunch will be on Palm Sunday, 13th April, 12noon** at St Catherine's. Taking time away from the busyness of life is not always an easy thing to do. There will always be something or somebody who requires our attention. But this Lent, if you can, why not try and find a few moments in everyday to find time to ponder, reflect, to look at the greatness of the universe in the smallest elements of creation. And in the stillness remember too and pray for our brothers and sisters around the world where war and conflict continue and the opportunity for peace so fragile. Stay safe and take care and every Blessing.

### Christingle at Candlemas

### Mothering Sunday or Mothers' Day

There is an old Jewish saying: God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers. Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16<sup>th</sup> century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families - which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed and in many ways now resembles the American Mother's Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

### A Pan crawl - what's one of those?



Some years ago our morning service at St. Catherine's was accompanied by the faint sound of a piper practising his bagpipes at Coalhouse Fort. On other occasions it was the tinkling sound of another musician playing his steel 'pan'. We are part of

the 'Open the Book' team that go into the Woodside Academy each Monday morning to dramatise a Bible story in the morning assembly and on more than one occasion had the opportunity to hear the youngsters playing their 'pans'.

However, when we recently spent a couple of weeks on the Island of Tobago we discovered just how important playing this instrument is in the culture of Trinidad and Tobago. At the hotel manager's reception there was a musician playing his steel pan. Going up a bit in size, you might have heard a steel band but have you ever experienced a steel orchestra - a whole new ball game!

During our stay we were asked if we would like to do a 'pan crawl' which we were told was an evening coach excursion to three pan yards to hear the orchestras perform in front of a panel of judges as part of a national competition. The 'crawl' element was the

fact that as each performance finished our coach had to rush to the next pan yard to arrive before the judges and the next performance started - the yards were some distance from each other. To give you some idea of the size of these 'medium' orchestras we were told that there were between 100 and 120 musicians playing. During the tour it was explained to us just how important this music is with it being taught in schools and university. I was particularly pleased to note that the instrument tuner



was credited for their involvement. The picture at the top of this article is of the Dixieland orchestra and hopefully you can appreciate the scale. It was however, the Katzenjammers that won the medium bands 2025 competition.



### The February meeting of the P.C.C.

The Parochial Church Council met at St. Francis on 24th February.

After opening with prayer and noting that Norman and Sheila King were on holiday and unable to attend, the meeting started by reviewing the preparations needed for this year's annual meetings which will be held on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> May after the morning service. This year our electoral role has to be completely revised meaning that those that wish to be on the role must reapply. Applications to be included in the new role can be made between 26<sup>th</sup> March and 20<sup>th</sup> April. It was noted that the annual report and accounts will be approved for presentation at the annual meeting, at the P.C.C. meeting on 14<sup>th</sup> April.

The meeting went on to review the various activities since they last met and in particular the Christingle workshop which was well received, and agreed the planned events in Lent, Holy Week and Easter (see flyer elsewhere).

In the business part of the meeting the previous meeting's minutes were approved and the wardens' and treasurer's reports were received. In dealing with these latter matters it was agreed to appoint contractors to check and certify the electrics at both churches, appoint an architect for St. Catherine's quinquennial inspection and a discussion was held about the merits / demerits of using the 'Parish Giving' scheme to deal with our regular congregational giving.

In Kim's safeguarding report she noted that training was continuing and that she was not aware of any issues of concern.

Revd. Michèle gave a brief report of the January Deanery Synod meeting and as there was no A.O.B. The meeting closed.

### The Baptism of Benjamin Mark

On Sunday 9th February, my grandson Benjamin Mark (who has taken part of his late grandad's name) was baptised into the Church family at St. Catherine's



### Norman's 'Christingle' memories

My Mum and Dad came to Essex in 1936 and had a flat in the first large Villa in Northumberland Road Linford. In the Downstairs flat was another couple from Manchester and Mum and Auntie Eunice became great friends. When I came along Auntie Eunice became one of my Godparents.

As I grew up she told me that she was brought up in a Moravian Settlement in Fairfield Manchester .Moravia is part of Chechia, so something in common with Bata. but the Moravian Church came to evangelise the north of England and the Fairfield settlement in 1785 was a self contained development with an inn, shop, bakery, night watchman, doctor and fire engine, housing about 110 with separate houses for married people and houses for brethren and sisters.

The reason I am writing this note is that Auntie Eunice made a Christingle for me and explained the importance and significance of a Christingle as a feature of the Moravian Church at Christmas. We had a Christingle service in St. Catherine's at Candlemas and one of the Mums told me that it was a very beautiful and memorable service. I did enjoy making the Christingles a couple of years ago and would have liked to attend the service this year.

A Christingle is made from a candle in an orange (representing the light and the world respectively) which is typically decorated with a red ribbon and dried fruits or sweets.

The candle or glow stick represents Jesus the Light of the World. The red ribbon represents the blood of Christ and the fruits or sweets on four cocktail sticks represent the fruits of the earth and the four seasons.

The custom of Christingle was popularised in the United Kingdom by John Pensom in 1968 when he was raising funds for the Charity The Children's Society.

Hopefully I will make the next Christingle Service in St. Catherine's
