

September is the month we think of as the place of new beginnings. Children return to school and older students take up a new chapter at college or university. There is the settling down after the summer months into the normal routines and looking ahead to the month of **October** and the changing of the seasons. Summer blooms are fading, there is freshness to the early morning air, 'Strictly Come Dancing' is back on a Saturday evening and autumn is emerging.

Autumn is definitely one of my favourite seasons and brings with it such a richness of colour. Leaves change from green to red and gold, conkers and acorns fall to the ground bringing delight to young and old alike. There is the crunch of autumn leaves under foot and the beauty of spider's webs in the early morning dew.

And late summer or early autumn is also the time in the churches year when we celebrate the gifts of creation. At Harvest Festivals in parishes around the nation we give thanks for the constant work of farmers, fishermen and all food producers. It is also an opportunity to take time to reflect on how we are called to be good stewards of the world we inhabit and how we must share what we have with those who are in need.

As a Church we support the Thurrock Food Bank. Each week people are encouraged to bring to church a small 'extra' from the Foodbank shopping list. And that small extra can make a big difference. On a Thursday morning at St Francis we host a Foodbank session and clients come with their Foodbank voucher to receive provisions to help them for a couple of weeks.

Items on the shopping list are: Jams & Spreads, Tinned soup, Tinned spaghetti, Tinned vegetables (peas, carrots, sweet corn), Noodles, Sweet snacks, Tinned Fruit, Desserts, Sponge puddings, Jelly, Rice Pudding & Custard, Fruit juice, Squash, Teabags, Coffee, Long-life milk. Toiletries: Soap, shower gel, shampoo & conditioner, toothbrushes & toothpaste.

Donations of food and toiletries can be brought to St Catherine's at any of our Sunday services or St Francis on a Wednesday morning 10.30am-12noon or on a Thursday 11am-1pm. All food items should be long-life and in date.

God calls us to help each other and Harvest time gives us an opportunity to do so. We thank God for the Blessings we know in our lives and reflect on how we might be a blessing to others.

Jesus said, 'love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind and love your neighbour as you love yourself'.

And as the Harvest hymn says, 'All good gifts around us, Are sent from heaven above; Then thank the Lord, O thank the Lord, For all his love'.

Chris and I were watching 'Songs of Praise' a few months ago, we tend to record it every week and then watch it at our leisure at some other time (this was the programme from 26th May if you want to find it on iplayer). In this episode, Patrick van der Vorst was interviewed by Aled Jones. Patrick is a Roman Catholic priest for the Diocese of Westminster, London and a former Director of Sotheby's, and the founder and head writer of the Christian art team that brings together a global group of writers,



translators, developers and artists who hope to bring people closer to the Christian faith using art and beauty. Our goal he said is to help people grow closer to God through the magnificent pairing of art and the Christian faith.

Each day the team offer a unique approach to the daily gospel readings. They select a work of art relevant to the day's scripture passage and offer a short written reflection on the two.

As a lover of art and the Bible I personally find it of great encouragement each day. An additional feature of the website is that you can interact with other members that have signed up for the free membership.

On their website they say their mission is to offer a pathway to grow closer to God through the beauty of art and the gospel.

The Bata Hotel, (Now Stanford House) so huge to me a child, rectangular with 'Bata' in bulky red and sloping letters on its roof. Home of the "workers" – Czechs and Poles and others too

High on the top floor was a gym and here we went to use the weights and pulleys, mats and heavy balls in a vain attempt to make our adolescent forms take on a different shape. Charles Atlas was the ideal chap in those far days.

Up flights of granite stairs all wide and echoing and grand with metal rail to grasp as up we rushed up and swung around the bends. Along each floor a corridor, broad and long and carpeted with doors, each with a little porch, along the side. We sometimes took the lift but often not because the porter who was small and rather fierce objected to our games.

I think he had a point in retrospect.

If our purpose was respectable we used the front, the swinging doors of glass and once inside might sit, for there were chairs and tables there all tubular and stainless steel.

The little Bata Library lay on the right and Thursday evening five o'clock I'd change my book and try to make a choice from the very few on one small children's shelf.

Ahead the stairs and little porter's room with board of hanging keys and to the left a dance hall which seemed huge to me with pillars broad and round and a shiny floor. Here annual children's parties were the highlight of the year with individual presents for us all. and here were held the dances, dinners, Sunday School.

Round to the right a "French" restaurant where office staff were lunched. It was also very good for Sunday Lunch. A Bata Post Office, Shoe Shop, Grocers, Butchers and a Snack Bar where we sometimes spent a lazy hour or two.

I went to the Bata Preparatory School. More like a private school in fact in a tall stark block, part hostel and part school. Long corridors with toilets at the end and rooms with windows high, too high for us at any rate. Grass all around with low green privet hedge. Miss Richardson reigned over all at school She had other teachers. Miss Goodwin in reception and Miss Spratt who married the Bata Farmer to become Mrs Way. Miss Richardson slapped our hands if her rules were broken. She then went red and had a neck just like a cockerel's leg. She made us work between the breaks when from a thick white cup we'd have our milk, luke warm, dull with a smell and skin. We had to shake hands with Miss Richardson as we left school and thank her for a lovely day. All of us are in her debt. Would she remember now. How I was made to mow her lawns each Sunday morn for two shillings and sixpence.

Where is she now, Miss Richardson? In tiny flat in Bournemouth with the rest or no more? I ate at nearby neighbour's house......to make ends meet while dad was at the war. I had

to finish all the food that lay there on my plate I never was much good with gristly meat and chewed and chewed 'til only minutes then remained for me to get to school.

One night, Oh, I remember it so very well Mum went to Fuller's van an old ambulance to buy some veg and fruit while I looked out the window upstairs front to keep her in my view and then I saw her run and dad was home, whether for good or not I do not know but it was lovely. There were sometimes gifts. Toy German soldiers I remember. Played with for so many years When dad was home we were together, all complete with the Enfield rifle under stairs to keep it safe and wrestles on the Sunday morning bed while breakfast was prepared by mum

My wartime memories are scant. The kitchen table under which we were to crouch in the event of bombs and things. Behind the house an air raid shelter.

The September P.C.C. Meeting

The Parochial Church Council met at St. Francis on 16th September with its main purpose being to plan the events for the rest of the year. It was agreed that we would largely follow the same pattern as last year but with the 'Christingle' workshop moved from the busy Christmas period to Sunday 2nd February which is the celebration of 'Candlemas'. It was also noted that on 29th December we would have our first joint service with the Linford Methodists in St. Francis at 10.30am. All the dates will appear in the Pewtalk calendar and in the weekly newsletter (which can be found via our website home page).

Revd. Michèle then outlined her ideas for a changed pattern of services from January 1st which is designed to allow her more of her limited time for pastoral matters.

The meeting then moved on to the business agenda when the minutes from the previous meeting were agreed. Les and Chris presented their report which covered churchyard matters including the fact that the Community Payback team had not attended because the team leader was on sick leave but the grass and rubbish had been kept under control with the help of volunteers. A meeting had been held with Bo Evans of the council's 'Emergency Planning and Resilience' team and both churches had been added to their list of places of safety. The churches boilers are to have their annual service on 21st October. A secondhand cupboard had been kindly donated by TRUP to give more storage for foodbank items.

Norman presented his Treasurer's report in which he noted that several members of the congregation have increased their regular giving. Also, we no longer receive any support for our energy costs although the reduction in our gas price will help. Finally he noted that our 'Parish share' for 2025 will be slightly less than this year's.

It was reported that the electoral roll had a new member and now stood at 51.. In her safeguarding report Kim noted that there were no issues and reminded the meeting of their training requirements.

The meeting reviewed the various church events since the July meeting and noted under A.O.B. that the sale of part of the St. James churchyard had been completed.
